The Leadership in Counter Terrorism Alumni Association (LinCT- AA) membership consists of program graduates. The purpose of the Association is to continue and extend the learning, cooperation and relationships developed between the senior law enforcement, intelligence, and military officials who have completed this international CT program. The following is a brief overview of the LinCT program and its history:

LinCT was initiated in 2004 as a joint leadership project between the FBI, Scottish Police College, the Police Service of Northern Ireland, The Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Harvard University and St. Andrews University;

Focus is on the prevention of terrorism;

There are three primary threads of content that are integrated throughout the program: Counter Terrorism, Intelligence and Leadership;

The program is primarily strategic rather than operational;

The critical outcomes are to improve inter-agency cooperation through enhanced communications, information sharing and personal relationships;

In 2006 the program was expanded to the Pacific Region in partnership with the Australian Federal Police and the Australian Institute of Police Management;

Participants represent the partner countries' domestic and Federal Law Enforcement, Military, and Intelligence Communities;

Program format includes an annual reconvention for program graduates to stay current and to expand important relationships; and

The LinCT program is governed by an international Board of Governors consisting of the Chief Executive Officers from the participating countries' lead agencies.



Arif Alikhan

Special Assistant for Constitutional Policing,
Los Angeles Police Department

Arif Alikhan is the Special Assistant for Constitutional Policing and the highest ranking civilian commander at the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD).

He oversees LAPD's internal audits and inspections, planning and research, risk management, legal affairs and government affairs. He also serves as a senior policy advisor to LAPD Chief Charlie Beck. Before joining the LAPD, Mr. Alikhan served in several senior homeland security, counterterrorism, and law enforcement positions in Los Angeles and Washington, D.C. He was a federal prosecutor with the United States Attorney's Office for nearly a decade, served as a senior advisor to two U.S. Attorneys General in Washington, D.C. and served as the Assistant Secretary for Policy Development at the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

His local government experience includes serving as the Deputy Mayor for Homeland Security and Public Safety for the City of Los Angeles from 2006 to 2009 and most recently as the Deputy Executive Director for Homeland Security, Law Enforcement and Fire Services for Los Angeles World Airports. He is a member of the Directors Advisory Board for the National Counterterrorism Center and has also served as a Distinguished Professor of Counterterrorism and Homeland Security at National Defense University.



Andrew Archibald

Head of the National Cyber Crime Unit

Andy Archibald is Head of the National Cyber Crime Unit (NCCU) of the National Crime Agency, responsible for leading the UK's Law Enforcement response to cyber crime. Andy's role involves setting

up the Unit, bringing together SOCA's Cyber Department and the Metropolitan Police Central e-Crime Unit to create one unit with the national lead for cybercrime. On a national level, he chairs the multi-agency Cyber Threat Reduction Board and, internationally, is the UK Head of Delegation for the G8 Law Enforcement Group and Chair of the 'Strategic Alliance' Cybercrime group.

Prior to the NCA's inception, Andy was a Deputy Director of the Serious Organised Crime Agency, responsible for Strategy and Government Relationships and, more recently, Cyber and Forensics.

Andy joined Lothian and Borders Police in 1984, where he held a variety of uniformed and detective roles, particularly in the field of Major Crimes, leading complex investigations and covert operations. He was the operational head of Special Branch from 1999-2000, where he led national operations.



Karen Baxter

Detective Superintendent,
Royal Ulster Constabulary

Detective Superintendent Karen Baxter joined the Royal Ulster Constabulary in January 1992. Following five years in uniform policing in rural and urban locations she transferred to CID.

She has spent a significant part of her service in investigation and fulfilled detective roles in volume crime, serious crime, review and intelligence. D/ Supt Baxter spent some time as a staff officer and uniform Inspector before being promoted to Detective Chief Inspector in April 2006. She conducted an internal review of how the PSNI delivered Child Abuse and Rape enquiries which resulted in a service wide change in how PSNI conducted investigations in respect of all sexual offences. She was responsible in the establishment of Rape Crime Units and involved in the formation of Public Protection Units. She also introduced training for Detectives involved in the investigation of sexual offences. This work significantly improved the response and quality of investigation to victims of sexual offences across Northern Ireland.

In 2011, as a Detective Chief Inspector she moved to the role of a Senior Investigating Officer in a Major Investigation Team. She is responsible for the investigation serious crime including murder, kidnap and terrorist.

In September 2011 she introduced and launched the 'One Punch' campaign highlighting the risks of assault and street violence. Since then she has worked with numerous external agencies including, Victim Support, Sporting Organisations, Education, Youth Justice Agency and the MOD to promoting awareness in respect of violent and sexual crime.



Marcus Beale

Assistant Chief Constable,
West Midlands Police

ACC Marcus Beale joined West Midlands Police in June 2011. He holds the Security portfolio, which has responsibility for the West Midlands Counter Terrorism Unit (WMCTU), the Forensics Department, and local policing

in Coventry and Solihull. In addition he is the West Midlands Police Chief Officer Lead for Equality, Diversity & Human Rights, and Health & Safety.

He joined the force as an experienced Assistant Chief Constable, having served at that rank for the previous 4 years with Staffordshire Police. For much of that time he was responsible for all their specialist crime functions (murder enquiries, tackling serious & organised crime groups, child abuse enquiries, fraud, hi-tech investigations, forensics, etc) and specialist uniform operations (firearms, public order, dogs, traffic, etc). In addition there were periods when he was responsible for Staffordshire Police's local policing, control rooms, and criminal justice administration. During his time with Staffordshire, he obtained a Masters Degree in Applied Criminology and Police Management from Cambridge University, with his thesis study exploring the deterrent effects of arrest on domestic violence perpetrators.

During his time with West Midlands Police ACC Beale has had significant command responsibilities in WMCTU operations disrupting some of the most significant UK mainland terrorist plots in recent years, such as the "London Stock Exchange" plot 2010, Operation Pitsford 2011 (the foiled suicide attack plan), Operation Alva plot 2012 (the failed attack on the Dewsbury EDL) and Operation Clockface 2013 (the mosque bombings within the West Midlands Police area and the fatal stabbing of an elderly Muslim male by an extreme right wing lone actor).



Charlie Beck,

Chief of Police,
Los Angeles Police Department

Charlie Beck serves as the Chief of Police for the second largest city in the United States, managing approximately 10,000 sworn and 3,000 civilian employees, encompassing an area of 473 square miles, a population of approximately 3.8 million people, and an annual budget where salaries exceed one billion dollars.

By promoting his predecessor's successful reengineering and reform effort, Chief Charlie Beck continues to evolve and refine those strategies to further the Department's position as the most effective and progressive law enforcement agency in the nation.

Chief Beck's law enforcement roots run deep with three generations of the Becks woven into the history of the Los Angeles Police Department. Chief Beck's father, George Beck, retired from the Los Angeles Police Department as a Deputy Chief; his sister, Megan, retired at the rank of Detective; his two children, Brandi and Martin, and son-in-law, Courtney, are all Los Angeles Police Officers.

Chief Beck was appointed to the Los Angeles Police Department in March 1977 after serving two years in the Los Angeles Police Reserve Corps. Chief Beck steadily rose through the ranks of the Department and was assigned as the Chief of Detectives, Detective Bureau, prior to his appointment as the 56th chief of Police of the Los Angeles Police Department.



Jon Boutcher

Assistant Chief Constable,
Hertfordshire Constabulary

Jon holds the post of ACC Joint Protective Services (covering Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Hertfordshire) which includes major crime, scientific services, roads policing, dogs, armed policing, cameras, tickets

& collisions and public order & civil contingencies.

He is the CT & Serious & Organised Crime Eastern Region Lead as well as the Deputy National Lead on Cyber Crime. Jon is also the National Policing lead on legislation relating to covert policing (RIPA) within the Crime Business area. As well as his national responsibilities as an ACPO CT Commander he was the Hertfordshire Gold Commander overseeing the Hertfordshire venue for the London 2012 Olympics.

Jon has 27 years' service spent mainly as a Detective in covert and proactive policing roles. He has also worked on Regional and National Crime Squads, targeting serious and organised crime groups with links to international networks and was responsible for a section of the 'Flying Squad' in London.

In 2003 Jon joined the Anti-Terrorist Branch at New Scotland Yard as the Senior Officer for numerous national security operations. Jon was responsible for the 'manhunt' that identified and arrested the 21/7 failed terrorist plotters. He also led the investigation in Scotland following the Glasgow airport terrorist attack.

He has worked within the Home Office as an advisor on Policing issues specifically related to national security and counter terrorism.



Ray Boisvert

Founder and President,
I-Sec Integrated Strategies

Ray Boisvert is the founder and President of I-Sec Integrated Strategies (ISECIS), a firm specializing in risk mitigation and deep business intelligence solutions. Through the use of tailored strategies and advanced technologies, Mr. Boisvert has worked with clients and strategic partners in the technology, transportation, advanced analytics, architecture, engineering, manufacturing and global retail sectors. He has also delivered numerous public presentations, participated on panels and given countless media interviews addressing topics such as cyber defense, "insider threats", terrorism entities, radicalization challenges, and a number of other national security related topics. Prior to launching his consultancy, Mr. Boisvert spent almost 30 years with the Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS), retiring as the Assistant Director, Intelligence.

He held several other executive and senior manager positions at CSIS, including responsibilities for the Counter Terrorism Program, as well as its Operations Support Branch, which covered all aspects of covert intelligence collection, including CSIS "special operations" teams.

Mr. Boisvert also spent several years overseas serving as a Foreign Collection Officer, working in close collaboration with allied and partner police, security and intelligence agencies. Earlier in his career he was an operational collection officer and supervisor, working across all areas of the Counter Terrorism and Counter Intelligence spectrum. Prior to joining CSIS, Mr. Boisvert spent five years in federal law enforcement with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), mostly in Drug Enforcement activities in the Lower Mainland (Vancouver) area of British Columbia.



David Lance Bowdich

Special Agent in Charge,
Counterterrorism Division
Los Angeles Field Office

David L. Bowdich reported to Los Angeles as the Special Agent in Charge of the Counterterrorism Division in September, 2012. Prior to his arrival in Los Angeles, Mr. Bowdich served as a special assistant to the associate deputy director at FBI Headquarters in Washington, D.C. In this role, he advised about risk management, personnel, administrative, budgetary and some operational issues, to include a comprehensive review of the FBI's counterterrorism training and curriculum materials.

Mr. Bowdich became the assistant special agent in charge of the San Diego Field Office in 2009. Mr. Bowdich formalized and initiated the first FBI hybrid squad in the country designed to target the threat posed by the kidnapping cells operating on both sides of the United States and Mexican border. Within one year, the interagency squad constructed a large-scale RICO case against 43 cartel members and associates who operated multiple kidnapping cells in the San Diego region. In 2011, Mr. Bowdich was selected to handle the transition of new FBI Director given that Director Muller's 10-year term expired in September 2011. After Director Mueller received a two-year extension, he was named special assistant to the associate deputy director.

Before joining the FBI, Mr. Bowdich served as a police officer and detective with the Albuquerque Police Department. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in criminal justice from the New Mexico State University and a Master's Degree in leadership from Georgetown University's McDonough School of Business. Mr. Bowdich and his wife have two children.



Frank J. Cilluffo

Associate Vice President,
Director, Homeland Security Policy Institute
Director, Cybersecurity Initiative
The George Washington University

Frank J. Cilluffo is an Associate Vice President at The George Washington University where he leads a number of national security and cyber security policy and research initiatives. Cilluffo directs the interdisciplinary Homeland Security Policy Institute (HSPI), is co-director of GW's Cyber Center for

National and Economic Security, and along with the School of Business, launched the university's World Executive MBA in Cybersecurity program. He also leads a new University-wide strategic effort, the Cybersecurity Initiative on policy, research and education chaired by Judge Michael Chertoff.

Cilluffo joined GW in 2003, establishing HSPI as a prominent nonpartisan "think and do tank" dedicated to building bridges between theory and practice to advance US security. Prior to joining GW, Cilluffo served as Special Assistant to the President for Homeland Security. Immediately following the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, Cilluffo was appointed by President Bush to the newly created Office of Homeland Security. During his tenure at The White House, he was involved in a wide range of counterterrorism and homeland security strategy and policy initiatives, served as a principal advisor to Governor Tom Ridge, and directed the President's Homeland Security Advisory Council.

Cilluffo is routinely called upon to advise senior officials in the Executive Branch, US Armed Services, State and Local governments, and US allies on an array of national and economic security challenges. He also frequently briefs Congressional committees and has testified before Congress over 25 times at high profile hearings on counterterrorism, emergency preparedness, cyber threats, and intelligence. Cilluffo has published extensively in academic, law, business, and policy journals, newspapers and magazines worldwide.



Robert Delaney

Curriculum Vitae

Mr Delaney commenced employment within the Australian Intelligence Community in 1987. Between 1987 and 1998 he worked in a variety of areas including Collection, Analysis and Operational Training. In 1998 he was

posted to the Australian High Commission in London as a Liaison Officer. Following his return to Australia in 2001, Mr Delaney held a number of senior operational positions.

In December 2005, Mr Delaney was promoted to the Senior Executive Service. In July 2006 he assumed the role of Manager New South Wales, based in Sydney.

In July 2007, Mr Delaney was promoted to First Assistant Director-General but remained in charge of the NSW Office, managing all of the organisation's activity in Australia's most populous state. Mr Delaney also manages the Operational Capabilities Division for the Organisation which provides operational support across Australia.

Mr Delaney is the only member of the Organisation's Senior Leadership Group who is permanently based outside Canberra. Mr Delaney is married with four children.

In 2008, Mr Delaney was elected to the position of Vice President of the Leadership in Counter Terrorism Alumni Association, representing the Pacific region. He served as President of the Alumni Association in 2011.

Peter has 41 years in the New South Wales Police Force with over three decades in specialist crime commands. He will be retiring in July 2014. He has a Law Degree and Graduate Certificate in Management and has received citations and commendations for police leadership. He conducted overseas research in the UK and USA on counter terrorism, kidnap for ransom, bank robbery and security in the USA, UK, France and Italy, and on police and security agency cooperation in the UK, USA and Canada. He is the author of internal papers on armed robbery and Force-wide SOPs for kidnap response and recognised by the NSW Industrial Court as an 'expert witness'. He has been the principal author and controller of a number of counter terrorist exercises. In 2000 he was the Crisis Team Commander for major investigative response arrangements during the Sydney Olympics. He coordinated the operations of the 10 major crime squads from 2001 to late 2006 and then transferred into the CT environment from 2007. He is a graduate of the LinCT 2007 program and a syndicate director in the 2009 program. He rose through all the ranks and in 2008 was promoted to his current position. A strong proponent for victims' families, Ms. Fetchet advocated for numerous 9/11 issues as well as the creation of the 9/11 Commission and reforms based on their recommendations. Ms. Fetchet testified before the 9/11 Commission and US Congress on five occasions. Her work has received national recognition including the 'Connecticut Hero' award by Senator Joseph Lieberman, ABC News Person of the Year, and NBC News Making a Difference. Most recently Ms. Fetchet was inducted into the Hall of Fame at Columbia University School of Social Work in NYC. VOICES is currently completing a Resource Kit to assist organizations and communities responding to acts of mass violence. The Resource Kit is based on extensive scholarly research and interviews with those who responded to the Oklahoma City bombing, the 9/11 attacks, shootings at Virginia Tech, Northern Illinois University and Tucson, Arizona. Andrew G. McCabe was appointed as Executive Assistant Director (EAD) of the National Security Branch (NSB) in October 2013. In this position, he is responsible for ensuring the FBI successfully executes its national security mission to defend the United States and its interests from national security threats, ranging from terrorism to espionage to weapons of mass destruction. He also serves as the FBI's lead intelligence official, responsible for coordination and liaison with the U.S. Director of National Intelligence and the rest of the Intelligence Community.

Mr Morris was appointed to the Australian Federal Police in 1986. Mr Nakatani previously held the post of Director of Information Systems and Technology at INTERPOL's General Secretariat headquarters (2008-2011), overseeing the development of innovative IT services for the global law enforcement community. He also served as Assistant Director of INTERPOL's Financial and High Tech Crime (2007-2008) where he specialized in cybercrime and cyber security issues.

Professor Neumann has authored or co-authored five books, including *Old and New Terrorism*, published by Polity Press in 2009; and *The Strategy of Terrorism* (with MLR Smith), published by Routledge in 2008. He is the author of numerous peer-reviewed articles, dealing with different aspects of terrorism and radicalization, especially 'homegrown' radicalization in Western countries.

Professor Neumann is a member of the editorial boards of two leading, peer-reviewed journals, *Studies in Conflict and Terrorism* and *Democracy and Security*, and serves as investigator for the National Consortium for the Study of Terrorism and Responses to Terrorism (START) at the University of Maryland. He is an Affiliate of the European Commission's European Network of Experts on Radicalisation, a member of the German Federal Criminal Office's (BKA) European Expert Network on Terrorism Issues, and sits on the advisory boards of numerous other think-tanks and institutions, including the Club de Madrid, the association of former Presidents and Prime Ministers.

At the Department of War Studies, Professor Neumann co-directs the MA program in Terrorism, Security and Society, and supervises six research students. He has taught courses on terrorism, counterterrorism, intelligence, radicalization and counter-radicalization at King's College London and the School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University, where he continues to serve as adjunct professor.



Matthew G. Olsen

Director,
National Counterterrorism Center

Matthew G. Olsen was sworn in as the Director of the National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC) on 16 August 2011 upon his confirmation by the U.S. Senate.

NCTC has two core missions. The first is to serve as the primary organization in the U.S. government for analysis and integration of all terrorism intelligence. In this role Mr. Olsen reports to the Director of National Intelligence. The second mission is to conduct strategic operational planning for counterterrorism activities integrating all elements of U.S. national power. In this role he reports to the President of the United States.

Mr. Olsen served as the acting Assistant Attorney General for National Security during the presidential transition. He supervised the daily operation of the Department of Justice's National Security Division. From 2006 to 2009 he was a Deputy Assistant Attorney General in the National Security Division and was responsible for the management of the Department's intelligence operations and oversight. In this position, Mr. Olsen supervised the implementation of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act and advised government officials on intelligence activities and national security.

From 1994 to 2006 Mr. Olsen was a federal prosecutor in the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia. From 2005-2006 he was the chief of the office's National Security Section. Mr. Olsen served as Special Counsel to the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation from 2004 to 2005.

Mr. Olsen graduated from Harvard Law School (J.D.) and the University of Virginia (B.A.).



Troels Oerting

Assistant Director,
Head of European Cybercrime Centre (EC3)

Troels Oerting started in the Danish Police back in 1980 and went through the ranks serving as Director of the Danish NCIS, Director of National Crime Squad and later as Director of the Danish Serious Organized Crime Agency (SOCA). He held positions as Head of NCB Copenhagen, Chair of the Head of Europol National Unit group (HENU), member of DK Europol Management Board delegation and Head of DK Schengen / Sirene.

Later he became Director of Operations in the Danish Security Intelligence Service and was promoted to Assistant Director in Europol in 2009. He has had various responsibilities in Europol's Operational Department and serves now as Head of European Cybercrime Centre (EC3) and in the past also as Interim Head of Europol Counter Terrorist and Financial Intelligence Centre.



Sue O'Sullivan

Federal Ombudsman for Victims of Crime

Throughout her career, Sue O'Sullivan has been an advocate for safe and healthy communities and for increased services to victims.

Ms. O'Sullivan began her distinguished career in policing in 1981, holding numerous leadership positions throughout her 30 years of service until retiring as Deputy Chief of Police (Ottawa). Continuing forward with her work, and drawing on her background and interest in assisting those affected by crime, Ms. O'Sullivan began an appointed term as Canada's Federal Ombudsman for Victims of Crime on August 16, 2010. She was renewed for a second three-year mandate in July 2013.

During her time as Ombudsman, Ms. O'Sullivan has continually placed a strong emphasis on ensuring that victims' voices are heard at the federal level and has pushed for positive change for victims of crime in Canada, including making recommendations to the Government of Canada on legislative and policy amendments.

Ms. O'Sullivan's passion for change and dedication to those she serves has been recognized on numerous occasions, including as recipient of the Queen's Golden and Diamond Jubilee Medals and the Police Exemplary Service Medal. Ms. O'Sullivan was also appointed, by her Excellency the Governor General of Canada, as an Officer of the Order of Merit of the Police Forces (2006).

Sue has a Bachelor of Arts in Law and Sociology with a subtitle in Criminology and Corrections (Carleton University) and is a graduate of the Police Leadership Program (OACP and the University of Toronto) and the Leadership in Counter Terrorism Program. She is also a past President of the LinCT Alumni Association.



Michael Richards

Deputy Director Intelligence,
New Zealand Security Intelligence Service

Michael (Mike) Richards was born in Sydney on 30 June 1954 and grew up in Adelaide and Melbourne.

Mike graduated from Monash University in Melbourne (Bachelor of Jurisprudence, 1975 and Bachelor of Law, 1978) and joined the Australian Security Intelligence Organization (ASIO) in January 1979. He progressed through operational and analytical postings mainly focusing on extremism sourced in or from the Middle East and between 1986-1988, served as an exchange officer with the United Kingdom Security Service. He then served in ASIO's Central Office in Canberra and ASIO's Sydney office before returning to Canberra in 1995.

He resigned from ASIO in 2000 to take up a job as a fraud and corruption investigator with the World Bank's Department of Institutional Integrity. While based in Washington DC, he travelled extensively to Bosnia, Indonesia, Philippines, Timor-Leste, Vietnam and India. Mike re-joined ASIO in September 2007 as a Branch Manager initially in Canberra but moving to Sydney in July 2008 to head ASIO's CT investigations in that city.

From late January 2011, Mike commenced a three year secondment as Deputy Director Intelligence with the New Zealand Security Intelligence Service.

Mike has a 26 year old daughter from a previous marriage and re-married in November 2011. His keen interest is in military history especially naval history and has ambitions to research and if possible publish on colonial fortifications in Australia.



Irfan Saeed

Senior Policy Advisor,
US Department of Homeland Security
Office of the Secretary
Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties

Irfan Saeed currently serves as a Senior Policy Advisor, in the US Department of Homeland Security, Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties. Mr. Saeed advises DHS leadership on policy issues at the intersection of civil rights and homeland security, developing and coordinating activities relating to countering violent extremism. Prior to joining Homeland Security, Mr. Saeed worked as a criminal prosecutor, at the state and federal level. Mr. Saeed worked as an Assistant United States Attorney, US Department of Justice, in the Eastern District of Louisiana, as well as an Assistant District Attorney, in New Orleans, Louisiana.

During his federal employment, Mr. Saeed has also worked extensively overseas. He served as the Resident Legal Advisor in two US Embassies- in Tashkent, Uzbekistan, and Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan. In addition, while deployed to the US Embassy in Islamabad, Pakistan, he was tasked to develop the Community Engagement Office, the first of its kind in U.S. Embassies worldwide, to use traditional public diplomacy tools to counter violent extremism (CVE) in Pakistan.

Mr. Saeed is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Academy, College of Analytical Studies, Quantico, Virginia; Loyola University School of Law, and Louisiana State University.



Pete Sparks

Detective Inspector,
Metropolitan Police

Pete Sparks has 25 years policing experience and has worked in Counter Terrorism and as a Homicide detective for 16 years. He is National Coordinator for families/victims in terrorism investigations in the UK and UK citizens killed overseas. He was in this role for the 7th July London bombings, the attacks in Mumbai, the Al Qaida IM attacks at In Amenas in Algeria, the Al-Shabab attacks on the Westgate Centre in Nairobi. He led the first joint Police/Military family liaison deployment following the murder of Lee Rigby, a British Soldier killed in London.

Following lessons learnt from the Algeria BP/Statoil attack DI Sparks has instigated far improved working practices between UK Government and Police, when British citizens are kidnapped/murdered abroad. This has involved training government staff in family handling during overseas crisis and has extended this to UK companies including BP, who have staff employed in hostile countries across the world. He has introduced standard operating procedures in conjunction with the Metropolitan Police Homicide department that have been adopted across the UK. This will ensure that the Family Liaison and DVI response to any future mass casualty incidents are coordinated and focused on the needs of the victims.

He has assisted the Civil Agency of Sweden and the Police in Norway in introducing family and victim support systems and most recently provided advice to the Canadian Resource Centre for Victims of Crime. He has been trained by the UK Military to enable him to operate in hostile environments internationally.



Richard W. Stanek

Sheriff,
Hennepin County

Richard W. Stanek, Sheriff of Hennepin County and is serving his second term in Minnesota's largest county with 1.2 million residents. He was first elected in November of 2006, and was re-elected in 2010.

Sheriff Stanek currently serves in leadership positions with several national organizations and on several national boards: National Sheriffs' Association (NSA) Executive Committee, chair of the NSA Homeland Security Committee, and vice-chair of the NSA Global Policing Affairs Committee. He is the immediate past president of the Major County Sheriffs' Association (MCSA). Among his responsibilities with MCSA, Sheriff Stanek participated in President Obama's national law enforcement working group convened by the White House to address gun violence and mental health.

He serves on both the Director of National Intelligence's Joint Counterterrorism Assessment Team (JCAT) and Homeland Security/Law Enforcement Advisory Board. He is a member of the Criminal Intelligence Coordinating Council (CICC). CICC members advise the U.S. Attorney General on national and international issues of public safety and criminal justice.

Sheriff Stanek earned a Criminal Justice Degree from the University of Minnesota and a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Hamline University. He completed training at the National Sheriffs' Institute, the FBI's National Executive Institute and Leadership in Counter-Terrorism, and the U.S. Army War College, National Security Seminar, 57th Session.



Kathryn McKay Turman

Assistant Director

Kathryn M. Turman is the Assistant Director of the FBI's Office of Victim Assistance in Washington, D.C. She oversees assistance to victims of federal crimes across the FBI, including child victims and U.S. citizens who are victims of terrorism and hostage taking at home or abroad. She oversees victim specialists in FBI field offices, child interview specialists, forensic operations specialist, medical social workers, and victim assistance rapid response teams that have deployed to support victims following numerous mass casualty crimes and disasters, including Virginia Tech, Fort Hood, Binghamton, Tucson, Aurora, Newtown, Boston Marathon Bombing, and the Washington Navy Yard.

Ms. Turman served in the Department of Justice from 1991 until 2002, as Director of the Missing and Exploited Children's Program, Chief of the Victim Witness Assistance Unit in the U.S. Attorney's Office in Washington, DC, and Director of the Office for Victims of Crime. Ms. Turman served on numerous national task forces and advisory committees and was recently appointed to the National Commission on Forensic Science. She authored articles and publications on issues such as reunification of missing children and victim assistance following terrorism and mass casualty incidents.

She received the Edmund J. Randolph Award, the highest award provided by the Department of Justice in 2001, the Attorney General's Award for Distinguished Service, and a National Intelligence Meritorious Unit Citation from the Director of the Central Intelligence Agency for her work on the Pan Am 103/Lockerbie prosecution, and the Presidential Rank Award for Meritorious Service.
